ABSTRACTS FROM PASSPORT REGULATIONS

- 1. Passports are issued in the United States by the Secretary of State, through the Passport Division, Department of State, Washington, D. C. Applications for passports should be made in person to clerks of Federal courts, clerks of State courts having jurisdiction in naturalization matters, or to passport agents of the Department of State. Passport agents of the Department of State are stationed at New York, Boston, New Orleans, Chicago, San Francisco, Seattle, and the Department of State, Washington, D. C. Applications should be filed from two to four weeks before the passport is required, depending upon the distance from Washington.
- 2. Americans residing or sojourning abroad should apply for passports through the nearest American consulate.
- 3. Applications for passports by persons in the Virgin Islands, Hawaii, Porto Rico, Guam, American Samoa, or the Philippines, should be made to the chief executives of those islands.
- 4. American passports are issued for two years unless limited to a shorter period. Such passports, if valid on July 1, 1930, or if issued on or after that date, may be renewed under regulations prescribed by the Secretary of State for two additional periods of not to exceed two years each. A fee of \$2.00 is charged for each extension of two years.
- 5. Americans making their homes or residing for a prolonged period abroad should register at the nearest American consulate.
